Shirley Grinley talked about 750,000 books for kids sponsored by H.C.E. and Public Television.


Kristen talked about the Family Resource Center of St. Croix Valley and sent around a paper consisting of items they can use.



Oatmeal Cinnamon Raisin Bread

2 cups uncooked oatmeal., rolled or quick

2 cups very hot water

1/4 cup dark molasses

1 Tbsp. salt

1 Tbsp. cinnamon

4 to 5 cups white flour

1 1/2 cups raisins

1/3 cup canola oil

2 Tbsp. agave nectar

2 pkgs. Active dry yeast

2 eggs



Combine oatmeal, raisins, and water. Let stand for five minutes then add canola oil, molasses, agave nectar, and yeast. Mix together and add cinnamon, eggs, and two cups white flour. Mix well and add additional flour to make soft dough. Turn out onto floured surface and knead until smooth, about five minutes. Place in oiled four quart bowl, cover with plastic wrap and let dough rise until double. Turn out onto lightly oiled surface and divide into two equal parts. Form into two loaves, place into loaf pans, oil top of loaves, cover with plastic, and let sit until double. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

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Health Nut Bread

1 cup almond meal

1 cup whole wheat flour

1/3 cup agave nectar

1 Tbsp. salt

3 1/2 to 4 1/2 cups white flour

1 cup flax seed meal

2 pkgs. Active dry yeast

1/4 cup canola oil

2 1/4 cups very warm water



Combine almond meal, flax seed meal, whole wheat flour, yeast, agave nectar, canola oil, salt, water and two cups of white flour. Mix well. Add additional flour to make soft dough. Turn out onto floured surface and knead until smooth, about five minutes. Place in oiled four quart bowl, cover with plastic wrap and let dough rise until double. Turn out onto lightly oiled surface and divide into two equal parts. Form into two loaves, place into loaf pans, oil top of loaves, cover with plastic, and let sit until double. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.




...if you knew that 2016 is the diamond anniversary of Maggie Hutton's "Homemaker's Prayer?

Taped inside the front cover of one of my cookbooks is a poem about a starling: The author observes that the bullying bird steals food and nesting materials from the other birds and wonders why such a species was put on earth in the first place. The writer of that rhyme was a farm wife who spent nearly every year of her long life in Warren Township. That woman's claim to poetic fame was not the piece about the starling, however. In 1941 she answered a newspaper advertisement with an entry that was not to be sneezed at. In fact, the poem she wrote seventy-five years ago still brings her state-wide acclaim. I was wondering if you knew that 2016 is the diamond anniversary of Maggie Hutton's "Homemaker's Prayer?"

She may have put pen to paper in 1941, but the first time I heard her actually recite the poem was shortly before noon, Tuesday, February 3, 1942. Stars and garters I can remember it as if it were yesterday. Nearly everyone in Roberts and Warren had their radio dials tuned to the Farm and Home Hour as it broadcast live from Madison. Our own Maggie Hutton on the radio—if that didn't beat the band!

"...Make our home a place sublime Where there's no room for hate or

A place where good friends gather





'round Where laughter, mirth, and cheer abound..."

Around this time, organized homemakers clubs were in their infancy in Wisconsin. Many of the members wanted an official state creed—a short statement of purpose that club members could recite together at the beginning of their meetings; something akin to a Cub Scout pledge or like school students who recited the Pledge of Allegiance every morning before their lessons began. They ached for powerful words that would meld them together in a common bond with all other homemakers in every Wisconsin community.

Word made its way to the ears of Lois Johnson Hurley and history began to unfold. In the late 1930s and early 1940s, Lois Hurley was the editor of "The Woman's Department" of the weekly Wisconsin Agriculturist and Farmer. With the blessing of the State's Home Economics Extension program leader, the Wisconsin Agriculturist ran a "Name the Creed Contest" in the early months of 1941. The contest was open to every woman in Wisconsin.

The state-wide submissions were judged by members of the original State Home Demonstration Council and narrowed to the best one hundred entries. These hundred were reevaluated to a short list of ten, and by July, the Homemakers had two lovely creeds. One was a statement of purpose and principle, written by Mrs. John Meise from Sauk County; the other was a prayer for guidance to maintain a good home and happy lives, written by our neighbor, Mrs. James Hutton. Sometime later, "The Homemakers Prayer" was

put to music by her rural River Falls friend, Lucille Phillips. The song was actually published and copyrighted around 1952.

Margaret Hutton was born to Francis and Carolyn Weishaar in the Town of Warren on St. Patrick's Day in 1892. She married James Hutton in 1917 and the two raised a son and three daughters on their Twin Lakes farm. Her husband passed in

1964 and ten years later she left the friendly confines of Warren to live with daughter Anita Bartoldus in the borough of Brooklyn, New York. She died at a hospital in Queens on November 26, 1982 at the respectful age of 90.

A few years after her passing, daughter Carol Fischbach of St. Paul found a few of her mother's poems hidden in a book and made copies for Maggie's dearest friends. I taped the poem about the starling inside the cover of my Homemakers cookbook. It reminds me of a humble lady who tried to understand the complexity of life even though she, like all of us, did not know the true purpose of the master plan. In her own words, "To A Starling" concludes as follows:

"... Most people wish to shun you But I'll try to understand, Surely you must do some good,

You are made by God's own hand!"

History is the collected memories of our past and I'm delighted to share my memories with you.

Beware of Holiday Frauds

With the holiday season in full swing, so are various frauds associated with it. Frauds tend to follow current events whether they are natural disasters like hurricanes, floods, and tornados or seasonal events like income taxes and end-of-year holidays. Unfortunately, the holidays can bring out the worst, as well as the best, in people as thieves, both in person and online, steal victims' money and/or identity.

Below are some common holiday scams to caution about:

Online Scams

Beware of e-mails asking you to provide personal information to receive a package. These are often phishing schemes to obtain personal identification information (PII) to commit identity theft. Don't click on links from unknown sources. Beware of "too good to be true" sales offers for relatively inexpensive high-end goods and electronics that request personal identification information. Fake retailer websites, may send shoddy merchandise or nothing at all and steal victims' PII. Beware of phony web sites with "off" logos and spelling and grammar mistakes and sales offers that require wire payment. Use an application like Norton SafeWeb to warn you about unsafe websites. Look for contact information on retail websites. For example, a phone number and physical location rather than a PO Box or sole e-mail address. Another indicator of a reputable retailer is a "Terms and Conditions" link for return policies. Beware of offers for "too good to be true" holiday season travel. The accommodations that are offered may be substandard or non-existent. Always deal with reputable travel agents and tour package providers. Make sure that online orders are secure by looking for https:// in the website URL of an online merchant.

Postal Scam

Beware of postcards for "undeliverable" packages. Some of these scams request PII or are a ploy to make expensive phone calls. For example, callers may be directed to the "hotbed" fraudulent area codes of 284, 809, and 876 in the Caribbean.

Shopping

Use a credit, instead of a debit card, for large purchases. Not only can you receive rewards, but the credit card company may be able to reverse charges for shoddy or damaged goods. With a debit card, check, or cash, your money is gone. Carry a minimum amount of cash, plastic, and personal information when shopping or traveling during the holidays and make sure that your wallet or purse is secure at all times and not left unattended (e.g., on the back of a chair).

Charitable Donations

Never provide donations and/or credit card information to telephone charitable solicitations. Some are outright scams and many have such high administrative expenses that very little money actually goes to the charitable cause. Donate money only to charities you know that are registered with the IRS. Check their 990 form at guidestar.com. Beware of phony charities that sound like legitimate ones (e.g., National Cancer Society instead of American Cancer Society). Beware of phony charities that make highly emotional appeals for disabled police, firefighters, and military veterans.

Package Delivery

Avoid having unattended packages left for delivery on your doorstep. Some criminals actually follow delivery trucks to steal victims' holiday packages. Require a signature for package delivery. If no one is at home, request that the package be given to a trusted neighbor or held at the nearest package pick-up depot.

Gift Cards

Inspect gift cards before you buy them to make sure that they have not been tampered with (e.g., having the activation code scratched off). Thieves who steal these codes can often use a gift card before the rightful owner.

Buy gift cards that are kept behind a store counter or near the cash register so clerks can keep an eye on them to discourage tampering. Get a gift card receipt for each gift card that you buy and include the receipt with gift cards as proof of activation and payment so recipients can obtain a replacement, if necessary.
