



- 5. The County HCE Board will designate a committee to select one applicant. An alternate will also be selected.
- 6. The Scholarship Committee of the County HCE board will select and notify who is to receive the award on or before April 15, presented to recipients at Spring Council meeting, held in late April.
- 7. The scholarship will be paid by the treasurer of the County HCE Board when he/she is notified that the recipient has successfully completed the first semester with at least a 2.0 GPA.
