State Fair Qualification-Demonstrations

There are now two ways to qualify to participate at the Wisconsin State Fair in Demonstrations.1) Attend the County Mini-Talent Explosion for

judging and receive recommendation for state fair attendance

2) Members can be recommended by their club general leaders as state fair participants. Members <u>MUST demonstrate at the club level</u> and receive recommendation by the general leader <u>by June 1 of</u> <u>that calendar year</u>. General leaders must provide feedback on the <u>demonstration criteria worksheet</u> currently used at the county judging event and contact the office by the deadline to indicate their approval for your demonstration to move onto the state fair competition.

Please be advised that State Fair participation is the responsibility of the member which includes travel

expenses and arrangements to and from the Wisconsin State Fair. Cost of staying at the Tommy Thompson Youth Center (approximately \$35/night and includes three meals in the cafeteria) is also the responsibility of the member. State fair participation for demonstrations varies from 2-3 nights at the state fair and includes an educational curriculum on public speaking. Members at the state fair demonstrate a total of three times over three days.

Tractor Safety

Tractor Safety June 17-20 8:00am – 3:00 pm St. Croix Central High School Ag Department

If you want to be able to drive a tractor on the road or for someone besides your parents you need to take this class. Farm jobs, nursery jobs, anything with a tractor requires this permit. Prevent agriculture accidents from occurring.

Complete a 28-hour class and pass both a written and driving test. This is a practical hands-on and academic week. All youth ages 12 and older working on any farm or business other than their parents. This is a Federal Employment Certificate for students 14 and older.

The cost for this class is \$30.00 payable on June 18 for each student. This fee covers insurance, books, tractors, fuel and facilities. Schools sending four or more students without a participating instructor will be charged \$200 to cover the need to pay for a trained instructor. This is payable to SCC FFA. You MUST have parental permission slips signed and returned on Monday morning (June 18) to drive tractors. The slips will be available on the first day of class.

You will need to find your own transportation to St. Croix Central High School on your own. Lunch will be eaten in Baldwin (Dairy Queen, Subway or McDonalds) so bring money or a sack lunch.

Shooting Sports Adult Certification Workshops:

A Wisconsin 4-H Shooting Sports Leader may be certified in archery, coordinator, muzzleloader, pistol, rifle and shotgun disciplines. Leaders may only teach in the discipline in which they are certified. An adult leader cannot provide hands-on or safety instruction without a certified leader supervising the range.

All leaders must first complete one 12-hour workshop to be certified. After that, you may be eligible to attend a Saturday, eight-hour range workshop to receive an additional discipline certification. If three years lapse before adding an additional certification, the full 12-hour certification must be repeated. Only on certification may be obtained at any one certification workshop. Any cat showing signs of illness or disease shall not be permitted to show. There's a limit of 1 Cat per Class with the entry fee of \$5.00/cat. Each exhibitor is allowed a total of two cats.

If you have a 4-HOnline account, YQCA ties directly to this system.

You must Pre-Register and pay for the class before attending. **Walk In's will not be accepted.** If you are in 13th grade, or age 19 (as of Jan.1, 2019), you are required by the YQCA program to complete the training online.

COOL for Youth Exhibitors Country of Origin Labeling (Sheep and Goats)

Basic premise of COOL: this is a government USDA rule that provides consumers with information of where their food originated. It is another step to protect the American food supply, and give choices to consumers. This is not USDA required for swine but is for sheep and goats and the SCLC IS REQUIRING them for all species.

Producers (youth exhibitors) need to provide documentation of the origin of their project animal.

You do not need to bring additional information to the first weigh-in. (**Remember**, if you purchased your animals from out of state, you need to bring along the import data that is required by DATCP.)

Animal Health Exhibition Update

Swine:

Wisconsin does not currently have specific requirements for movement of swine within the state of Wisconsin except to fairs, shows or exhibitions. Official individual ID, a certificate of veterinarian inspection (CVI) and an import permit are not required. For animals traveling to a fair, show, or exhibition, please visit our Fairs, Shows, and other Special Events page:

https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/FairsS howsSpecialEvents.aspx.

Swine from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following: official identification is not required unless required by individual fair/exhibitions/shows. Statement that vet has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days before the show with no apparent disease. Terminal shows, no testing is required. For nonterminal shows testing for Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Virus (PRRS) and Swine Enteric Coronavirus Disease (SECD) is required as follows: - If negative tests of herd of origin within 90 days prior to movement, pigs can move to fairs or shows as noted above. Documentation of the negative test results must be made available upon request. Test results, test type, and date of testing need to be included on the CVI.

- If positive tests for either PRRS or SECD of herd of origin within 90 days prior to movement, the herd will be quarantined until a herd plan is established and approved. Swine may be able to move to the fair or show in accordance with the herd plan. Include the test results, test type, date of testing an, and herd plan number on the CVI.

- The herd of origin refers to the current herd with the current owner. The current herd of origin will be required to have had a test within 90 days of movement.

Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:

• USDA ear tag number

- USDA 840 button ear tag
- Ear notch
- A tattoo or anear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- A microchip
- Breed association tattoo

Beef:

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

Cattle from outside Wisconsin must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) documenting official animal ID and all required tests and certifications
- Have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers)
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see <u>http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/</u> <u>Cattle_Bison</u>)

Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin

- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag)
- USDA animal identification number tag 15digit number starting with 840
- Manufacturer-coded RFID tag 15-digit number with the first three digits beginning with 9 (accepted as ID when applied before March 11, 2015)
- American ID tab –12-digit number prefaced with "USA"
- Other ID approved by DATCP

Burcellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

• There are no requirements for brucellosis testing or vaccination.

Tuberculosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin:

 Need Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) with Official Identification of the animal written on the CVI. See <u>https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Service</u> <u>s/SheepGoatMovement.aspx</u> page for Official Identification options.

Required:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) with complete physical origin and destination address
- Official identification written on the CVI (one of the following):
 - Scrapie tag (flock or serial)
 - Official USDA RFID 840 tag (15-digit number beginning with "840")
 - Complete and legible breed association or registration tattoo, accompanied by registration papers in owner's name
 - Tattoo with both a USDA assigned flock number and a unique individual ID number
 - USDA-approved implanted microchips when implanted in the animal and either registered by a breed association with the number

recorded by the registry on the registration certificate accompanying the animal, or for sheep participating in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program

- <u>Import permits</u> for goats from Michigan's Modified Accredited (MA) Zone (see below) and sheep or goats that are rodeo stock or part of a multi-species menagerie, such as a petting zoo
- If there is a current vesicular stomatitis diagnosis or quarantine in the state of origin, effective May 30, 2014, Wisconsin no longer requires a permit or special statements.

Goats from Michigan's Modified Accredited

Zone: Need import permits, and must return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CFI that they will be doing do.

TB testing and requirement:

- Need negative whole-herd TB tests within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin
- Need negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- Quarantined on arrival and require TB test between 60 and 90 days after arrival
- Must return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so
- No eligible to be sold at consignment sale or auction
- An import permit is required

Track Leader: Shelley Pecha
