Dear 4-H Families,

Snow, snow and more snow! I hope everyone is looking forward to spring.

One thing that 4-H is known for is its ability to be inclusive. Throughout the many aspects of our program, we make strides to ensure that youth and adults are included in the activities and projects that we do. To take the issue further, Extension and 4-H abide by Federal laws that relate to inclusion.

Based on the Federal laws, Extension does not discriminate against specific protected populations. Categories of prohibited discrimination include race, color, gender/sex, creed, disability, religion, national origin, ancestry, age, sexual orientation, pregnancy, marital or parental status, arrest or conviction record, or membership in the national guard, state defense force or any other reserve component of the military service.

We also are required to make reasonable efforts to have accommodations as stated in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Consistent with the Americans with Disabilities Act, persons who need materials in alternative format or other accommodations must write or call the UW-Extension contact person for the specific program or Extension Office at least ten working days prior to the event.

Finally, as a part of UW-Extension Civil Rights compliance, we are working to become more inclusive in our 4-H program. Making efforts to reach out and make contact with families who are not in our program currently is part of our role in the Civil Rights compliance process. In the future, you will see St. Croix County 4-H getting involved in more outreach to diverse populations and more promotion to those that we don't currently serve. If you have ideas on how to reach these populations, please contact us.

This is going to be an ongoing process, it won't happen overnight. We know that we already make a difference in the lives of youth, and there are many more youth that we aren't reaching. We appreciate your continued support and working relationships as we work to provide educational programs designed to empower the diverse citizens of St.Croix County, because 4-H can truly make a difference in the lives of all youth!

4-H Volunteer (VIP Training) - Want to become a 4-H leader?

Monday, March 11, 6:30pm; Ag Center Ag Center (1960 8th Ave., Baldwin)

The Wisconsin 4-H program depends upon the more than 20,000 adult volunteers to help youth gain skills. Volunteers are the backbone of the 4-H Youth Development delivery model, and serve as mentors for youth. Training helps volunteers understand the program and their role and provides an opportunity to ask questions about the 4-H program. All volunteers who work with 4-H youth must attend a volunteer orientation workshop and go through the Wisconsin Youth Protection process.

Pre-registration is required. You can register by calling the UW-Extension Office 715-531-1930 or by

emailing Heather at <u>heather.vierling@ces.uwex.edu</u>. Please provide your name, club, contact information and the date of the orientation program you wish to attend. Each orientation will last about 1 ½-2 hrs. In addition, volunteers are required to fill out 4HOnline enrollment information, acknowledge volunteer expectations, and complete a mandated reporter training online module. Background checks are conducted on new volunteers and repeat every four years for continuing volunteers. Any adults working with 4-H youth other than their own children must comply with these requirements.

Living Memorial Award Nominations due April 1

We all know people who put a lot of time and effort in the County Fair to make it a success each year. Sometimes they are out front and very visible to all of us and sometimes they are people who work quietly behind the scenes. The Living Memorial Award is a way to honor those individuals. The actual award is a bronze plaque that is permanently displayed on the monument near the flags at the fairgrounds. It is a "surprise" award that is presented during the County Fair.

State Fair Qualification -Demonstrations

There are now two ways to qualify to participate at the Wisconsin State Fair in Demonstrations. 1) Attend the County Mini-Talent Explosion for judging and receive recommendation for state fair attendance 2) Members can be recommended by their club general leaders as state fair participants. Members <u>MUST demonstrate at the club level</u> and receive recommendation by the general leader <u>by June 1 of</u> <u>that calendar year</u>. General leaders must provide feedback on the <u>demonstration criteria worksheet</u> currently used at the county judging event and contact the office by the deadline to indicate their approval for your demonstration to move onto the state fair competition.

Please be advised that State Fair participation is the responsibility of the member which includes travel expenses and arrangements to and from the Wisconsin State Fair. Cost of staying at the Tommy Thompson Youth Center (approximately \$35/night and includes three meals in the cafeteria) is also the responsibility of the member. State fair participation for demonstrations varies from 2-3 nights at the state fair and includes an educational curriculum on public speaking. Members at the state fair demonstrate a total of three times over three days.

The demonstration opportunity at the Wisconsin State Fair has been known to be an incredible experience for the youth from St. Croix County. General leaders should contact the office to request the judging criteria form. Questions can be directed to DeAnn Hammer at <u>deannhammer@gmail.com</u>.

Tractor Safety

Tractor Safety June 17-20 8:00am – 3:00 pm St. Croix Central High School Ag Department

To become knowledgeable in operating Ag equipment. If you want to be able to drive a tractor on the road or for someone besides your parents you need to take this class. Farm jobs, nursery jobs, anything with a tractor requires this permit. Prevent agriculture accidents from occurring. Complete a 28-hour class and pass both a written and driving test. This is a practical hands-on and academic week. All youth ages 12 and older working on any farm or business other than their parents. This is a Federal Employment Certificate for students 14 and older.

The cost for this class is \$30.00 payable on June 18 for each student. This fee covers insurance, books, tractors, fuel and facilities. Schools sending four or more students without a participating instructor will be charged \$200 to cover the need to pay for a trained instructor. This is payable to SCC FFA. You MUST have parental permission slips signed and returned on Monday morning (June 18) to drive tractors. The slips will be available on the first day of class.

You will need to find your own transportation to St. Croix Central High School on your own. Lunch will be eaten in Baldwin (Dairy Queen, Subway or McDonalds) so bring money or a sack lunch.

Shooting Sports Adult Certification Workshops:

A Wisconsin 4-H Shooting Sports Leader may be certified in archery, coordinator, muzzleloader, pistol, rifle and shotgun disciplines. Leaders may only teach in the discipline in which they are certified. An adult leader cannot provide hands-on or safety instruction without a certified leader supervising the range.

All leaders must first complete one 12-hour workshop to be certified. After that, you may be eligible to attend a Saturday, eight-hour range workshop to receive an additional discipline certification. It is another step to protect the American food supply, and give choices to consumers. This is not USDA required for swine but is for sheep and goats and the SCLC IS REQUIRING them for all species.

Producers (youth exhibitors) need to provide documentation of the origin of their project animal. You do not need to bring additional information to the first weigh-in. (**Remember**, if you purchased your animals from out of state, you need to bring along the import data that is required by DATCP.)
